Commodore's Corner, by Rob Weaver, Commodore

The best part of November is that after the 5<sup>th</sup> we will all stop receiving the 20 or 30 pieces of campaign notices that do absolutely nothing to explain anything about propositions or candidates beyond telling us that the world will end unless we vote for a proposition or candidate, or that the world will end if we do vote for the same proposition or candidate. The only thing I can conclude from the daily barrage of "information" is that too many trees are being sacrificed for too little information. The worst part of November is that our season is officially over except for a steam up event and bottle boat regatta. It has been a great year, but it seems to have gone by way too fast.

ELECTION/HOLIDAY CELEBRATION: On December 14<sup>th</sup> we will elect a new Board. If you haven't spoken to our nominations committee, DO SO NOW. Jim Forbes, Carl Brosius and Mary Rose Cassa are still looking for members who will fill positions and volunteer to keep the club running again next year. All members are eligible and you can self-nominate. The members of the nominations committee do not elect officers, they only find people willing to serve – find them before they find you.

On December 14<sup>th</sup> we will also have our annual Holiday Celebration Luncheon at the club. Memphis Minnie's will once again provide delicious bar-b-que. After lunch, awards to deserving members (and some not so deserving members) will be given out. For all the winners it is a time to shine – so come out and impress your spouses, family members and the guys who came in behind you in the racing. Elsewhere in this Nautical News you will find a reservation form. Fill it out, send your money and plan on a great day with all the friends you met at the club last year.

**LAKE REPAIRS:** In all likelihood when you see the "Lake Repairs" heading in the Commodore's Corner you pass on by without reading the paragraph. We all know that for several years the Lake Repair news is pretty much the same: "someday in our lifetimes something will be done about the sidewalk and lake edge." Well, this month is different.

On October 17<sup>th</sup>, the Rec and Parks Commission allocated \$600,000 from its Open Space Fund Contingent Reserve to "Repair the failed shoreline edge and restore the collapsed shoreline pathway." Also, you may have noticed spray painted arrows and other painted signals on the North Shore walkway. New asphalt will be put on November 5<sup>th</sup>! The shoreline repair should all be conducted behind a portable coffer dam and not impede our activities on the lake. The coffer dam will be a rubber bladder inflated with water, so even Freesail Boats should be able to operate with limited interference.

**ODOM NCR:** In October, the Board voted to host the 2025 ODOM National Championship next year on September 5 – 7. Dick Hunter has stepped up to be the Principal Race Officer. He will be ably assisted by Ron Saxon (the ODOM national class secretary) and Jim Wondolleck. The first day will be for practice and measurement, and racing will be on the following Saturday and Sunday. In order to compete, your boat must be registered with the class secretary and you must be a 2025 member of the American Model Racing Association. Knowing that a large portion of the club's ODOM Fleet have not registered their boats and have not joined the AMYA, the Board agreed to subsidize each SFMYC member who participates in the event by payment of \$25 to the member to defray the cost of the entry fee, boat registration and AMYA membership. Not a bad deal considering the fact that the AMYA will contribute \$15 to the club for each person participating in the event. The entry fee for the event is \$65. Dick is currently working on the NOR and application form. We are shooting for at least 20 boats to participate, and plan to race in 2 fleets under the RC Sailboat Heat Management System. More on that later.

RAG TOP/STINK POT RELAY: One of the highlights of Opening Day each year is the annual Rag Top/Stink Pot Relay, when all power, RC sail and free sail boats have a chance to participate in what always starts out as a well-organized race, but generally devolves into chaos, confusion and random action. As always, the fun is not in the race, but in the one opportunity for all of the squadrons to participate on the water together. The event was the brain child of the late Tony Marshall. With Tony's passing, Jim Forbes made the brilliant suggestion that we should honor Tony with naming the Rag Top/Stink Pot Relay after him. The Board has asked for suggestions, and all suggestions will be presented to the Board in November for final approval. "The Tony Marshall Rag Top/Stink Pot Relay", "The Tony Marshall Ragtop/Stink Pot Regatta"? If you have any input or suggestions please send me an email.

NEW BOARD AND GENERAL MEETING SCHEDULE: At the October meeting the Board voted to support a new meeting schedule which will, in part, make it easier to serve on the Board and make General Meetings easier to attend. In essence, the Board will present the following new meeting schedule to the members at the November meeting: Every other Board meeting will be conducted remotely by Zoom, General Meetings will only be held six times a year on months when the Board shall meet in person at the clubhouse. Pursuant to the bylaws, the club is only required to hold four general meetings a year and there are no restrictions on how Board Meetings occur. WHAT THIS MEANS TO POTENTIAL BOARD MEMBERS IS THAT YOU WILL NOT HAVE TO TRAVEL TO SAN FRANCISCO EACH MONTH TO ATTEND A BOARD MEETING. This will make serving on the Board much easier and less time consuming. One more reason to get on the phone or internet to contact Jim, Carl or Mary Rose and put your hat in the ring for election in December.

**ANNUAL SWAP MEET:** The annual swap meet is scheduled for November 16th. Get there early while there are still good buys available. It is an annual tradition to bring the stuff you bought last year that you discovered you didn't need or want and try to resell it. Of course the model boat addiction will likely just cause you to buy more stuff this year. But always remember that there will be another Swap Meet in another year and you can sell what you really shouldn't have bought this year. And, who knows, you may actually find a treasure this year that will help you finish a project or repair a boat.

On October 24, I received an email from Dave Iribarne, Superintendent of Golden Gate Park, happily announcing to Commodore Weaver and me that the project to repair Spreckels Lake edge received approval for funding by the Commission! Dave Iribarne will keep us posted as soon as he knows more. Of course, it will likely still be a number of months before we see any actual work, as they need to send out bids and follow all their processes. Though the wheels turn very slowly we're now on the way!

It also looks like the pavement repair on the northeast shore is moving forward. The orange paint markings along the degraded walkway seem to indicate a beginning. Again, this too may take a long time and may even be a part of the lake edge repair, but we are glad to see this bit of progress.

Our next quarterly meeting with Dave Iribarne will be November 19.

The day of our final M-Boat race of the season greeted us with clear skies and temperatures edging


their way to the warm end of the spectrum -- positive traits we can rely on seeing this late in the season.

Bernard Price also had problems with his well-sorted *Batteries Not Included*. He found that the helm was binding and fixed the problem, but not before sacrificing too many points to remain competitive.

#### X Class Doyle-Ferrari Cup, Saturday, October 12th

The last X Class race of 2024 was held on October 12. It was a moderately breezy day with very variable winds. The participants in order of finish were: myself, Jeff Stobbe, Jason Spiller, Mike Stobbe, and Bernard Price.

Truthfully, the winds were actually flukey, which made it a Braine day, and the winner was the only one with a Braine controlled rig. Vane controlled rigs do much better than Braine controlled rigs when there are steadier winds. The Braine controlled rigs merely have a tiller/rudder offset, along with "LiverPool Boys" to



harden up the main and back wind the jib during the beat, and lines to force the boat to follow

down with wind on the run. LiverPool Boys are the elastic lines running from the starboard toe rail to the main and jib booms, causing the sails to harden up, as in the case of the main, and back wind, as is the case with the jib, helping the boat in coming about from starboard to port tack when there is a wind shift on the beat.

Jeff Stobbe sailed his new X boat, named Crazy D. Jeff molded the hull directly from two half



hulls made from popsicle sticks designed by his friend.

As an X class boat *Crazy* D is short and has a huge beam, but its boat speed seemed better than average. Jeff fashioned this boat in honor of his friend known as, Crazy Dennis.

The most-improved sailor award (if there is one) goes to Bob Pinotti for claiming fourth place on the season. Bob Gallagher, the 2019 ODOM season champ, who also previously served admirably as ODOM Fleet Captain, finished fifth in the 2024 season standings. And finally, Jason Spiller, another past muti-time champ in ODOMs and several other classes, deserves the longevity award for remaining a regular competitor at age 95, over 50 of those years as an active SFMYC member.

Weighing in between 23 and 28 pounds, and being a couple of inches shy of 6 feet long, it can be pretty daunting to get these big boats sailing in light conditions. As it turned out,



the wind was light, but pretty constant. The fleet had no trouble sailing over the glassy waters of Spreckels. In fact, it is was a little magical seeing the boats glide over the lake with constant winds of 4-5 mph.

Smooth sailing on a calm lake in October. Is there a better way to spend an afternoon?

Of course, there was a dead spot near the top of the course, but these beasts had no trouble rounding the weather mark and heading downwind. The secret was to take all the speed the wind would give you and glide around the mark. It is amazing how far the momentum of these boats will take you if you only exercise a little patience and avoid getting in irons.

The day had two high points. In the first race, and in his first Santa Barbara race, new member Rob Yohai got an excellent start, and led the fleet around the windward mark and both leeward marks. Unfortunately, he was unaware of what Dick Hunter calls the Jason Spiller lift that will hit your boat if you hang onto the port tack after the leeward mark until just before the starting line. Rob Y. tacked early not having the benefit of local knowledge and was promptly passed by Rob Weaver who trusted that the Jason Spiller lift would hit and take him on a sleigh ride towards the finish line. In another race, Ron Ulrich did everything right for over half the race, and no one could catch him around the first two marks. His boat was sailing fast and he was picking all the right spots until he lost his concentration at the bottom of the lake and got passed. Now he just has to remember what he did and repeat it around the full course.

The other news from the class is that Michael Fischer has organized informal racing in the off season. We will race Santa Barbaras (rain or shine according to Michael) on the third Sunday of each month this winter starting November 24<sup>th</sup>. Don't worry if the wind is light. As we proved at the last race of the season, the big and heavy boats don't seem to have much difficulty sailing in the light stuff.

# In the Workshop 'JERSEY GIRL' A Scratch Built Boat – Part 1, the hull

'JERSEY GIRL' A Scratch Built Boat From 'Jersey Coast Kingfisher' Online Plans



Back story: Early in 2017 a longtime friend and fellow SSMA member, Ken Valk, and I were on the hunt to locate a design for an oyster dragger or 'buy boat' to build up and add to our fleets. Mutual friend Ralph Perkins, a model designer and engineer, suggested a Howard Chapelle 'Work Boat' design that would fit our needs. Ken and I, and two other friends, each built an RC model of that Chapelle design.

Howard Chapelle 'Work Boat'

Well, in the original search for a work boat, I found another plan online that looked good, nice lines, and one that could be scratch built into whatever kind of fishing boat we wanted. So, I ordered the plans, then had them enlarged to bring it closer to the scale I like; 45" long by 131/2" wide. However, these plans got stowed away for a while until 'it was time' for me to unroll the drawings and build the boat, six years later!

Please follow along with me as I build one up from the online plan called the 'Jersey Coast Kingfisher'!


The boat builds into a very nice-looking fishing vessel, very close to the original boat we were looking for, only with less draft.


These plans are still available

online from eBay today. Note that the picture shown on the eBay site is not exactly the same as on the plans, but kind of!

The plan set

This very vintage (1958) plan set, showing an old DeBolt servo for steering and an original style Pittman 6-volt motor to power the model, brought back early memories of my first radio control set. I would love to know how many sets of plans for this boat have been sold over the years.





#### Bulkheads

The build: First off was cutting out all the templates to trace all the bulkheads and formers on 1/8" balsa sheet. Enter an old building trick I use. I apply M77 (3M Super 77 Multi-Purpose) contact spray on the back of the paper templates, just one side, and smooth them

down over the balsa wood. They stay in place quite well, good enough to cut all your bulkheads and then simply peel off the paper. And the glue stays on the paper when you pull it off. This makes for perfect bulkheads and formers when done this way.



Next was laying out the keel and adding a little more depth to the stern area to enable an increase in the prop diameter. It was the first modification to the build I made. The prop size would go from a 1-1/4" to 2-3/8" (for better handling).

Laying out the keel

The location of the formers to the keel are next, with stations set and marked. I used all balsa wood formers throughout,

which back in 1958 when these plans were drawn was the material of choice (but could be easily substituted for 1/8" light plywood today). Not my typical build setup but I had a lot of 1/8" balsa sheet, so I stuck with the plan, squared them up and cemented them to the keel.

Moving on, with the hull set upside down now for a more typically built platform, the planking was started. Again, the plans called for balsa, 1/8" by 1/2" planks, but I found it much easier with 1/8" by 1/4" balsa planks. I'm going use epoxy and a 3.7-ounce glass cloth to cover all of it when finished. That gives good strength to the overall hull.

Planking

Now, I'm not much of a fan when it comes to planking (is anybody?). It's a painstakingly tedious process and I can't wait to see that last plank go into place.





Finally planked

After some careful sanding and shaping I did get it into a respectable ready-for-glass hull, smooth and true.

Now, happily, it's time to lay on the 3.7-ounce glass cloth and epoxy resin. I don't like to do more than I can manage while glassing so I just do

one half of the hull at a time. I have done whole hulls but it can get a little hectic when your resin starts to set. It's worth the wait to be patient and do the other side the next day!

Glassing the hull

I use the West Systems Epoxy Resin # 105 and their # 206 hardener. It was bought with their pump dispenser which gives me an exact measured amount with each pump.

Another tool I like to use is a kitchen spatula for a squeegee. I cut them down to the size I need and it's a little more flexible, easier to use. And they clean up with denatured alcohol very well.



Once you have both sides done it's time to sand the hull again, then give it one last 'finishing' coat of resin. Most of this resin is squeegeed off, leaving a very thin layer to facilitate final sanding in support of the final finish.

Time to crib the boat keel down on the building board, to start on the decking and finish planking. Tune in next month for Part 2 -- The Completion with a Lowell Grand Banks Dory.
